



Beyond Pascal's Wager

After fourteen questions answered with the visual help of the cross, one might be wondering if God is more than three attributes, particularly when the numbered "Wrath of God" Cross in Revelation results with seven bowls of God's wrath instead of happiness.

Is there a risk of losing one's faith with acceptance of God of Creation like unto a cross as the true and complete biblical God of salvation?

Pascal's Wager is named after 17th-century French mathematician, physicist, and philosopher Blaise Pascal. The point of Pascal's wager is that one cannot come to the knowledge of God's existence using reasonable speculation alone. So the wise thing to do is to live one's life as if God exists, because one has nothing to lose and everything to gain.

According to Pascal's Wager if one lives as though God exists, and God does exist, one gains afterlife. If God doesn't exist, one loses nothing.

However, if one lives as though God does not exist and God really does exist, one ends up in hell, and has lost afterlife in heaven. Considering the two choices, the rational choice is to live as if God exists.

Farquhar's Wager is named after American Bible mathematician, theologian, engineer and author JW Farquhar. The point of Farquhar's wager is that one can come to the knowledge of God of Creation using the likeness of God's reason introduced in the Bible's Creation, validated by holy numbers in the Bible and taught by Jesus and Paul. With the four-fold God of Creation one has nothing to lose and everything to gain.

According to Farquhar's Wager if one believes as though the fourfold God of Creation exists, and God of Creation does exist, one gains after-life. If God of Creation does not exist, a Christian loses nothing, because the fourfold God of Creation already includes the Trinity.

However, if a Christian believes God of Creation does not exist and God of Creation really does exist, the Christian violates God's first Commandment by worshipping a non-biblical, incomplete triune-god, not written in any Bible, ends up in hell, and has lost afterlife in heaven.

Considering the two choices, the rational choice is to live as if the biblical fourfold God of Creation exists and the Doctrine of the Cross is true.
